Angela G. Cai, M.D., M.B.A., is focused on representing the Emergency Medicine trainee voice in workforce issues, advocacy, and career planning guidance. She completed residency at SUNY Downstate-Kings County and is now pioneering an innovation fellowship in Emergency Medicine at US Acute Care Solutions.
